Pollution reported

We reported an oily spill entering Narrabeen Lagoon from a drainage line near the Coastal Environment Centre. The EPA and Pittwater Council agree this is caused by iron leaching from an old "dump" where Rat Park is now. The water is being consistently tested to ensure that it is not dangerous for people or wildlife but it does look bad! However, a native water rat seems to be thriving in there.

Navigation Markers in Narrabeen Lagoon

Navigation buoys will be installed in the next few weeks to mark the large shallow area in the central basin which is colonised by legislatively protected seagrass beds. The markers will show the navigation channel from Jamieson Reserve (12 locations in total). Together with feedback from a range of user groups, Department of Primary Industry (Fisheries) and Roads and Maritime Services, Warringah Council staff have considered popular recreation routes, lagoon depth, shallow seagrass areas and international navigation guidelines when designing the layout for the markers. This layout has the advantages of:

- Identifying the shallow areas in the central basin and directing users to deeper water
- Identifying vulnerable seagrass ecosystems and creating routes around them. This may allow an increase in lagoon biodiversity.
- Not 'overcrowding' the lagoon with markers that would create visual clutter and obstacles

Posters and pamphlets will be provided to user groups, and Council will be installing interpretive signs near the Lagoon.
